Victims of Domestic Violence Know Your Rights!

- Under New York State's Human Rights Law, it is unlawful to discriminate against someone because the person is a victim of domestic violence.
- New York State law protects victims of domestic violence from discrimination when they attempt to rent or lease housing. It also provides victims with a defense in eviction proceedings and a private right of action.
- Under the Federal Violence Against
 Women Act, it is illegal for a
 landlord participating in a federally
 subsidized housing program, such
 as Section 8 housing, to deny or
 terminate voucher assistance based
 on victim status.
- It is unlawful to discriminate against a domestic violence victim in hiring, firing, condition of employment, job advancement, requests for use of leave time, or in retaliation for filing a complaint of discrimination.

What the Courts Can Do

If the person who harmed you or threatened you is a relative by blood or marriage, or is someone you've had a child with, or is someone with whom you are or have had an intimate relationship, or is someone who lives in the same household or has in the past, then you have the right to take your case to family court, criminal court, or both.

The courts can decide to provide a temporary order of protection for you, your children, and any witness who requests one, or on behalf of pets.

The family court may appoint a lawyer to help you if the court finds that you cannot afford one.

The family court may order temporary child support and temporary custody of your children.
